Cartons
Orange juice, milk, broth

Metal cans & clean aluminum foil, pie plates & trays

#1, #2 and #4*, #5*, #7* plastic food & beverage containers (bottle & non-bottle packaging)

Phone books

Corrugated cardboard & paper bags (flattened)

Newspapers, brochures & inserts (no plastic bags, do not tie & bundle)

Paperboard boxes (cereal, pasta & tissue)

File folders & office paper

Not Acceptable

- No scrap metal
- No VHS/VCR tapes
- No plastic bags
- No needles or syringes
- No window panes, mirrors, ceramics & Pyrex® dishware
- No stickers or address label sheet waste
- No plastics other than those listed
- No electronic waste (batteries, cell phones, computers, etc.)
- No paint, pesticides, oil & cleansers
- No motor oil or antifreeze containers
- No organic material and food waste
- No waxed paper or waxed cardboard
- No Styrofoam™ or paper to-go containers
- No plastic caps
- No hard cover books

PLEASE NOTE:
—Village residents are asked not to flush certain items down their drains (sinks, toilets, tubs etc.), paper towels, napkins, diapers, baby wipes, other wipes such as Clorox, Windex, etc., ladies' products, cloth or any similar-type materials. These items are commonly found in the Village sewer system and can wreak havoc. Many residents don't realize this, but such materials can cause blockages in the system, which can result in sewer backups in homes, businesses and other facilities. Please try to be considerate and dispose of such materials properly. It will save money and problems in the long run.

Mayor's Message.....

It is with a great deal of sadness that I report the recent passing of three individuals who gave so much of themselves to the Village of Montgomery and our entire community - Charles Wallace, Lolly Romer and Cynthia Byrnes. Charlie was a member of Montgomery Fire Department for forty plus years and was the Chairman of the Fire Commission since 2004. He was tragically struck by a vehicle while directing traffic in front of Montgomery Fire Department on January 10th. This was a job he performed admirably so many times over the years. He passed from this line of duty incident less than a month later, and the whole County was in grief-stricken shock. He gave so much of his life giving back to Montgomery, especially the Village. He served on the Village Planning and Zoning Boards, the General Montgomery Day Committee, the Parkland Committee, numerous committees and offices in Montgomery Fire Dept., and he served on so many volunteer organizations in our area. He was a soft-spoken man who was always willing to help in whatever way he could. Thanks to the tenth degree to Montgomery Fire Department for making Charlie's service heartwarming and memorable. He remains a hero to all of us.

Lolly Romer was the owner of the Airport Inn for over forty years and was respected throughout our tight-knit community. She developed strong friendships with more people than I can mention here and many counted on her for advice on all kinds of issues. She imparted many words of wisdom with me that have helped me succeed on projects and issues. There was nothing phony about Lolly Romer. She was a straight shooter who had a huge heart. She loved her family, her job, Montgomery and Crazy 8's. The great memories of Lolly and the Airport Inn will not soon be forgotten in Montgomery.

Cynthia Byrnes was quite simply one of the kindest people you would ever want to meet. She was vintage Montgomery and loved all that pertained to our small community. She was a devout Catholic who was quite active at St. Mary's Church and missed helping with BINGO when it ceased on Wednesday nights at the Hall. Cynthia loved her conversations at the Village Luncheonette with the locals, enjoyed great dinners at 88 Charles and vacations at Hilton Head Island. More importantly, she loved her family and spoiled her grandchildren immeasurably. Thanks Cynthia for giving so much to our Village fabric.

Premises Identification: (per NYS Fire Code)

505.1 Address numbers.

New and existing buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

505.1.1 Residential dwellings.

All residential dwellings shall display a lighted street number in a prominent location on the street side of the residence entrance in such a position that the number is easily visible to approaching emergency vehicles.

505.1.2 Commercial buildings.

All commercial buildings shall display a lighted street number in a prominent location, visible from the street.




505.3.1 Multiple-family dwelling

There shall be positioned at each entrance of a multiple-family dwelling complex an illuminated

diagrammatic representation of the complex which shows the location of the viewer and the unit designations within the complex.

New Cardinal Drive Water Tower

The Village will soon be completing the new water tower on Cardinal Drive (see picture). This tower will hold 380,000 gallons of water, much more than the Prospect Terrace Tower, which holds about 200,000 gallons. The Prospect Terrace Tower is due for major maintenance soon, and the new tower will give much needed relief during that process. The new tower will handle our water storage needs for many decades into the future. Some residents asked why the new tower is sited at this location. Quite simply, the tower has to be at or near the highest point in the Village that is owned by the Village. The Village Board picked the forest green color to blend in better with the surrounding neighborhood. The tower should be on line by the end of April. It has been a long time in the works and will be a welcome addition to our infrastructure. A



two-hundred thousand dollar H.U.D. Grant helped fund this project.
